

Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. 2 Corinthians 9:7

²"So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. ³But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, ⁴so that your alms may be done in

secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. Matthew 6:2-4

¹But a man named Ananias, with the consent of his wife Sapphira, sold a piece of property; ²with his wife's knowledge, he kept back some of the proceeds, and brought only a part and laid it at the apostles' feet. ³ "Ananias", Peter asked, "why has Satan filled your heart to lie to the Holy Spirit and to keep back part of the proceeds of the land? ⁴While it remained unsold, did it not remain your own? And after it was sold, were not the proceeds at your disposal? How is it that you have contrived this deed in your heart? You did not lie to us but to God!". Acts 5:1-4

One of my responsibilities as Pastor of St. Mark's is to teach and promote Biblical Stewardship. While I don't like to talk about money any more than you like to hear about it, I have come to realize it is time for me to stop shirking that sometimes-difficult responsibility and get serious about what Biblical Stewardship is all about.

First of all, Biblical Stewardship is not about "paying the bills", or "doing my share." Biblical Stewardship is all about giving as God has given to us and giving as God *expects* us to give. Too often, I'm afraid, we, like Ananias, overlook what God expects in favor of what we are comfortable with.

The passages above show some of the difficulty in teaching and promoting Biblical giving. On the one hand, it feels good to give (be a cheerful giver), on the other hand, Jesus tells us not to make a show of our giving, and on the third hand(?) if we don't give as God expects, do we face the fate of Ananias?

I recently read the words below in *No One Gets There Alone* by Dr. Rob Bell. I was immediately struck by how it applies to one of the best kept secrets in most of our lives; how much we give to the church:

We are only as sick as our secrets. Is the culture of our environment one fraught with secrets or transparency? When we hold onto a secret, do not provide credit to someone else, call out someone for a little mistake, or put someone else down, we create a culture of it in our surroundings. Secrets perpetuate this notion of fear, scarcity, self-seeking, selfishness, and not helping others. Although keeping secrets is easy, communicating the truth is more difficult. The number of secrets we have inside of us indicates our overall health. The fewer; the better. The notion of secrets isn't also advocating that we need to tell everyone everything. Is it even possible to be completely honest with another person? We often conceal our own issues or insecurities so we can continue to act in specific ways. And it isn't so much the secret as it is about the story we need to tell ourselves about the secret. We need to believe in the narrative so we can continue the secret. However, when we hold onto secrets, they hold onto us. It is like not bathing, but putting on aftershave or perfume to cover it up. The degree of trust with one another is a large determining factor of success. Information and best practices get shared more, credit is freely given, and the culture of us becomes collective.

Think especially about concealing "our own issues or insecurities" and "the story we need to tell ourselves about the secret". Why do so many of us not give as God expects? What have we been telling ourselves about our giving? Why are we insecure about practicing Biblical Stewardship? Why do we not want others to know how much we give? Pride? Guilt? Our average annual giving per confirmed member of about \$533 shows that some of each is in order, since some are giving considerably more and others less.

Why are we so secretive about our giving? Much ado was made over the fact that Donald Trump was reluctant to hand over his tax returns; would you allow our church treasurer to go over yours? At the risk of being like one of those hypocrites Jesus warns about, I will disclose that Marian and I regularly give over one-tenth of our income to the church, and if you want proof, I can produce it. While our giving should not be a source for public show, neither should it be anything to be ashamed of.

No one likes to be told what to do with their money and I am not the one to tell you. So, don't listen to me, go to the Bible, find what both Old and New Testaments say about giving as the Lord expects. You won't hear about giving from me often, but then **it is my responsibility** to teach and promote Biblical Stewardship.

June 2018 Parish Post Article From Council President

Growing up in the Catholic church it was common to hear messages promoting discernment of vocations into ordained positions. It was a fairly effective message. On a few occasions I contemplated whether God might be calling me into the priesthood. Instead I felt my calling to serve God was elsewhere as a husband and father. I know others from my home church who did go to seminary and are now ordained priests.

Now we just celebrated Pentecost and a sort of calling to vocations for Jesus's disciples. It seems fitting now to acknowledge the ways in which several of our St. Mark's family are responding to callings of their own. First of which is the calling to affirm the sacrament of baptism. On Pentecost Sunday we had the opportunity to confirm three young men, Christian, Nathaniel, and Tate, who accepted God's call to live lives as followers of Christ.

The second example is the call our youth have heard to act out their faith this summer. From our St. Mark's family we have 26 attending the Harrisburg area confirmation camp; of which ten are serving as staff, seven as counselors, one deacon, and eight others as campers. Through the conformation camp program youth have opportunities to witness to others in their faith journey. Aside from camp, we are also pleased to be sending a number of youth and advisors to the National Youth Gathering in Houston, TX. Alongside thousands of other attendees from across the U.S., they will certainly see God at work in the world and how they can help to fulfill His Mission.

But when it comes to discerning a vocation to serve God and His church, there are two people who certainly have answered yes in different ways. On one hand we have our own Kellen Michalowski, who over the last few years has moved ever closer to a vocation in youth ministry. Kellen's experiences have helped him discern his calling and has accepted the role of Director of Youth & Family Ministry at St. Mark's beginning this summer. Then we have lifelong member Troy Spencer whose next step in God's call is the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago as he begins preparing for his vocation as an ordained minister.

We want to extend our best wishes and Godspeed to all these young men and women, especially Kellen and Troy in their specific areas of vocation.


Other Recent Council Action:
