It can be surprising sometimes where inspiration comes from, but then, I've always said that if you look for God everywhere, God might show up anywhere. For example, I'm reading Iron in My Hands by Dave Draper (former Mr. America, now 78 years old) and Dan John (well-known strength coach) and I wanted to share this quote with you:

"The world situation: Who can fix it? We've been trying forever, here we are today and it's still a beautiful mess. Still, our individual participation is vital. Don't do anything to make it worse, and maintain a positive and productive atmosphere around you. Contribute where you can with your talents, knowledge, awareness and energy, and recognize in your head and heart that you're doing just that. You count. You influence your surroundings far more than you realize. Your smile can light up a room; your glare can darken it. Imagine what your laughter can accomplish right about now. Earthshaking.

*The local situation:* it's called daily living. We all face it, endure it and cope with it. Now is the time to recall we have also loved it, applauded it and could not get our fill of it. The road is winding and rough, and then it's a highway. There's the storm and there's the calm, the steep climb and the mountain's peak. One cannot be without the other, you note, if you're paying attention. Here it comes again. Breathe deep; grab on, hold tight and go with the flow. Look up; observe, learn and grow. This too will pass."

This book was published in 2016, but it could very well be addressing the situations around us this week. We have

Layoffs, cutbacks, delays in unemployment compensation, neighborhoods in turmoil, and boredom and doldrums from lack of places to go, people to see, and things to do, have had a dramatic effect on many of the people we know and love. Yet, in the midst of it all, we hear Jesus say, "do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today."

Jesus was addressing a crowd that was concerned about many of the same things that worry us; money, security, even food, clothing and shelter. He wasn't just spouting platitudes, he gave good reason for not worrying, "indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things." Faith in our heavenly father means trust in God's ability and desire to provide for us, his children. Like Martin Luther in his commentary on the Ten Commandments, Jesus also gives a positive response to offset the admonition against worry, "But strive first for the kingdom of God and his right-eousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

"Do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." It's not just "don't worry, be happy", it's "DON'T WORRY, BE FAITHFUL!"

Many of us, myself included, have felt the fear, anger, shock and the feeling of just being overwhelmed. So much feels different. I pray that all of you are doing well as can be expected and staying safe.

While so much feels different, some things remain constant. The love of God, our connections of friendship and prayer and our commitment to each other. Through the wonders of technology and his dedication to all of us as congregants and beyond, Pastor Jim has been providing us with wonderful messages each week through virtual worship and Wednesday bible study sessions. One of the best things we did in my mind was to have a "drive through" graduation for our nursery school Pre-K Sheep class as they prepare for Kindergarten. Many thanks to Pam Baranowski and her dedicated crew for that. Thereby proving we don't need a building to be St. Mark's…we need each other.

I want to thank you for your financial commitment to St. Mark's. Your gifts have helped to sustain the mission and ministry of our congregation. Your support is critical. I hope your circumstances will enable you to continue your usual contributions. We do know what devastating personal economic challenges have been occurring so please know that you are in our thoughts and prayers.

Decisions, decisions, decisions. We make them every day, some taking split seconds, while others require deeper thought about advantages, dis advantages and consequences. After a little over 2 months of Romania's declaration of a state of emergency, the government has downgraded the level to "state of alert." Masks and social distancing are mandatory, but the

curfew has been lifted. Stores are open for business if their public entry ways lead directly outside (in other words, only some stores within a mall qualify). Restaurant seating is still closed. Churches are closed, but parishioners can worship outside, following social distancing regulations and observing mandatory signage with directions for sanitization and social distancing.

So, I went for a walk for the first time (without groceries) in the past 65 days. In previous outings, I guesstimate about 75% of the people I saw had masks, and no more than 2 people were seen together at a time. Surprisingly, today demonstrated a much lower regard for social distancing protocols. Only about 50% of people were wearing masks, and groups of 4-10 people were roaming around (mostly late teens/early twenties). This makes me feel disheartened that exposure to COVID-19 will be increased beyond control in the upcoming weeks.

Please continue to pray for me as I patiently await decisions this week. Specifically, I'm waiting to hear when I can safely return to the 2 shelters that I connected with, as well as from my travel agent to postpone my plans to return home this summer. For now, I'm scheduled to food shop for needy church families at the end of the week.

You must act according to the decisions they give you at the place the Lord will choose. Be careful to do everything they instruct you to do. (Deuteronomy 17:10)

St. Mark's is planning to resume worship in our Nave on June 14, 2020

In order to best prepare for safe gathering, after reading these guidelines, please call the church office before 3:30PM, Thursday, June 11 to let us know if you will be attending and which service, 8:15 or 11:00 AM

Thank you for your prayers and patience as we go through the COVID-19 pandemic. On March 13, when we made the difficult decision to worship remotely, we joined with people around the globe in an effort to save lives and keep people safe. While we were successful in "flattening the curve," lives were still lost, and the economy took a hit. We are ever grateful for the leaders and staff of this congregation who enabled us to quickly develop a consistent online presence through Facebook and through our website. We are also grateful to our Bishop and his staff for their guiding hands.

Now it is time for us to look towards the weeks and months to come. This letter specifically addresses how we will worship our God. We expect that these recommendations will be too stringent for some and not stringent enough for others. We fully trust that the good people of this congregation will con-tinue to live together in respect and care for one another as we seek to come back to worship.

As has you may have heard, Bishop Dunlop recommended that no in person worship take place before May 31st, Pentecost. Further, our Council affirms following government guidelines for social distanc-ing. Since Dauphin County entered the Yellow Phase, in accordance with state recommendations, St. Mark's will move towards having people sitting in the pews.

Here are our Task Force recommendations, which will be reviewed several times in the coming weeks and months. None of what is offered here will be permanent but will remain in place as we work to-gether:

We will worship in the Nave, to allow for maximum spacing and fresh air. Social distancing must be observed.

We will use a full bulletin which will be placed on the pews. All hymnals and pencils have been removed from the pew racks and placed in storage for now.

We will require that all worshippers wear masks, especially while speaking or singing. Masks will be available if someone does not have one. Even if we are not concerned about getting sick, we are concerned about not getting other people sick.

Entry and exit will be through Handicapped entrance only. Doors will be propped open.

Hand sanitizer and offering plates will be available in the Narthex. Members are asked to sanitize upon entering the building and drop their offering in the plate when entering the Nave. The ushers will bring the offering forward at the appropriate time and place it on the credence table by the organ.

In order to maintain social distancing, congregants will only sit in every other pew leaving one empty pew between all worshippers. Pews will be marked accordingly. Within the pew, social distancing will be maintained. Members of the same household may sit together.

We will sing but will minimize the amount of singing. Anyone who chooses to sing must wear a mask.

Passing the Peace: Worshippers will stay in place. They may speak a word of peace, nod, smile, use peace sign, use American Sign Language, touch their heart, etc.

For communion, we will use wafer only; Pastor will be masked and will sanitize prior to distribution; Pastor will come to the pews using the center aisle. Congregants will be encouraged to wear masks for Pastor's safety; Pastor will place wafer in communicant's hand; and, once Pastor has moved on, congregant can pull down mask and consume wafer.

Following the last hymn, worshippers will be instructed to be seated. Pastor will dismiss by pew.

Restroom availability will be limited to those near the choir room. Worship space and restrooms will be sanitized between uses.

Regarding outside groups using the building: Prior to the shutdown, groups using the building were advised to make their own decisions regarding meetings. Following the sanitization of the building, outside groups were advised to cancel all meetings. No outside groups have used the building in the past several weeks.

Regarding virtual presence: We will continue online presence for several weeks once we reopen and maybe beyond. There will be many of us who are at high risk and cannot join us, or may not feel safe to return even if precautions are in place. We will be working to put a team in place to provide this ministry on an ongoing basis.

Should there be a surge in virus cases, we will follow Good Shepherd's long tradition of following government guidelines. If the Governor asks us to be closed, then we are closed. If anyone in our community is tested positive, the congregation will be notified immediately.

Again, these recommendations will be reviewed frequently and adjusted accordingly.

God bless the flexible, for they will never be bent out of shape!
