The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. First Corinthians 1:18

You may have heard the joke about the Atheist that went to court complaining that all other religions get holidays, but there are none for Atheists. The judge threw the case out, explaining to the Atheist that they do, indeed, have their own holiday; April Fools' Day!

While Paul was not trying to be facetious in his letter to the Corinthian church, his message is pretty much the same as the judge in the joke, "The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing...". Paul's message is actually somewhat of a two-edged sword. On one hand the message that the One who came to save the world would be willing to die on a cross makes no sense to those who lack faith in Jesus. On the other hand, for those of us who walk by faith, it is foolishness to not believe in the One who gave his life for the sake of the world.

Lent and Holy Week, especially, are wonderful opportunities to not only reflect on, but also to strengthen our faith in this "foolish" message. During Lent we have been hearing the stories of God's covenants with his people, covenants God kept but his people too often failed to live by. In our Gospel readings we travel with Jesus to Jerusalem where he will suffer, be killed, and on the third day rise from the dead. During the weeks of Lent, like the rest of the Church year we travel at warp speed through the Jesus story. We leap from Jesus' birth to his public ministry some thirty years later. From his baptism we rush along through about three years of miracles, healings, exorcisms, preaching and teaching in less than twelve months. Holy Week, though, is different! The week before Easter Sunday, the week of Jesus' most intense persecution and suffering, as well as his most profound teaching, is lived in real time, from the high of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem through the deep valley of his suffering and death, pausing for the anxious waiting outside the sealed tomb, then, finally, on Easter day, celebrating the marvelous news of his glorious resurrection.

During that week, this year March 25 thru April 1, we will have some wonderful opportunities to come together, with Jesus and the disciples, to relive that fateful, wonderful, tragic, triumphant week.

Wednesday of Holy Week we will have a prayer vigil that lasts most of the day. Prayers will be lifted up for the world, the Church, our community, and individual needs and concerns. Maundy Thursday we will come together at both Noon and 7:00PM to receive the Body and Blood first offered by Jesus in remembrance of him. At the Thursday evening service several of our young members will receive their First Holy Communion, putting them in the very place of the disciples as the first recipients of that Holy Meal. Friday will be traditional Good Friday worship, a solemn time of remembering that the day is not "Good" because of what happened; the death of Jesus. It is "Good" because of the effect of his death; ransom for our sins and the coming resurrection to eternal life.

This year we will be adding a new opportunity to experience the full range of emotions of Holy Week as we observe Easter Vigil, a time that begins outside, in darkness, by the light of a fire, watching to see if Jesus will keep his word. From there we will proceed to the church where the light slowly rises and we receive the assurance that his promise has been kept.

Holy Week is an intense time in the Christian year that should not be ignored. If we hope to truly appreciate both the joy and sacrifice upon which our faith is founded, Holy Week is essential to our faith formation. I might even say you would be a fool to miss it!

COUNCIL PRESIDENT

When I prepared my letter for January I did not yet have financial results for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2017. We had been running an operating deficit (expenses exceeded income) most of the year. But God provides, which is why I am incredibly grateful to all of you. Thanks to your generosity all year, especially during December, gifts of support rose sufficiently to cover our operating expenses.

That's a great place to be starting a new year. With all our financial obligations for 2017 covered we began 2018 with a clean slate. When starting the year like this it really leaves wide open the possibilities of what we can do with our ministry. It also lends the opportunity to reflect upon the gifts God has given each of us and how He wants us to use them.

St. Mark's is incredibly active in many ways. Our Ministries and programs touch countless people of all backgrounds throughout the year. We can't possibly know how many people have come to love God and find belonging in this community of Christ by way of St. Mark's Ministries. So many more are certain to experience it in 2018. As long as we always focus on loving our neighbors and sharing God's Word, our gifts will be put to good use.

God gives gifts of talent with which we serve His church locally and globally. Here at St. Mark's we've established standing Ministries to lead and guide the church in its initiatives. Each serves an important role in the overall mission of the church. The structure and organization of our Ministries can be likened to any complex machine - each part has a purpose and all parts must be operating for the whole to function. Your car, for example, simply will not function if

critical components like wheels, engine, transmission, or electrical systems failed. Sure, you'd still have what mostly looks like a car, but it wouldn't serve its purpose of transporting you from one point to another.

The same is true of the twelve established Ministries of St. Mark's. I firmly believe that St. Mark's is best succeeding in its mission when a dedicated individual is leading others in fulfilling the specific objectives of each Ministry. We're not there yet, but we have been making good progress toward reinvigorating Ministries that have lacked leadership and direction for years. The members of Council recognize and appreciate those who are serving St. Mark's in this capacity. We also invite and encourage others to discern how you are called to use your talents to serve the church.

Next month I'll use this forum to focus on God's gifts of treasure and how we choose to use those gifts.

WHAT ON EARTH AM I HERE FOR?

I've always admired the manner in which Charlie Roberts is able to connect with youth and adults alike. He has charged us to share our "God Moments" openly (that's right, step out of our comfort zones!) This charge happened to be spot on with one of my devotions that day that I'd like to share with you from Pastor Rick Warren on my Bible app:

"Put God's Word into Practice. James says it is self-deception when we merely listen to God's Word and don't let it change us. We think that just gaining knowledge makes us spiritually mature, but the test of maturity is not knowledge. The test of maturity is character. We need to put God's Word into practice. We need to continually apply it in our lives. In fact, knowledge increases responsibility. The more we know, the more we're accountable for. What am I doing about what I know? Jesus said, 'Much is required from the person to whom much is given' (Luke 12:48). The simplest definition of maturity is to be a doer of the Word. You do what the Bible says. We must not only read the Word; we must also heed the Word. Every single one of us knows more spiritual truth than we're putting into practice right now. We don't need to know more, we already know enough. We just need to put into practice what we already know. Be a doer of the Word."

You don't have to be a preacher, missionary or Sunday School teacher to "be a doer of the Word." This Lenten season, get back to basics. Renew your dialogue with God. Spread the love that God embraces with us.

"And this is love: that we walk in obedience to His commands. As you have heard from the beginning, His command is that you walk in love." (2 John 1:6)

May your Lenten season be purposeful in sharing His Love. - Ruth Cheng

DOING SOMETHING NEW

In the fall, I asked, Why church?

Why do you attend?

What is the value of church in 21st century America, where there seems to be a growing sentiment away from the institutional church of our youth?

If you've been attending "The Table," or meetings that I have attended in the recent months, you would also hear me asking why St Mark's exists.



I don't have any doubts myself. If you know me, you know I have strong opinions on why. But I'm curious about YOUR answers, and so is Pastor Jim.

Many American Lutheran churches are declining. Not only in attendance, but in relevancy. The reasons they were started have long since faded, and their ministries seem to exist merely to serve the needs of those who still attend. Is that reason enough to exist? Maybe in some cases, yes. But we are not a church in decline. In fact, compared to many synod congregations, we are quite healthy, some might say even "vibrant."

So why worry? Why even ask these questions? Because God is doing something new here! God is stirring the Spirit in this place, which seems to be leading us towards that vibrancy, a vitality perhaps. Churches grow by invitation. You invite a friend! However, **people** <u>stay</u> because of authentic community, a sense that I am not only welcome, but have a role to play here. My gifts are valued and important. I have a chance to contribute to something bigger than myself, an opportunity to be part of God's plan, in this place and time.

So please take a moment between now and Easter to answer these questions:

Where do you see God in our congregational life together?
If St Mark's ceased to exist, what would this community lose? What would be missing?
What do you believe is our mission as a church?

You'll sometimes hear me ask, "what is the Spirit up to in our congregation?" Which is simply another way to ask, where is God calling us, or what is our mission. We have some exciting ministries here right now, but if they are not the ministries that we feel God is calling us to do, or if we are not responding passionately as the people of God, then we may need to rethink our direction.

I'm excited to hear your answers, and even more excited to see where God is leading us. Write, speak, and listen to one another. Let the conversations begin!
