I am currently reading Spring Chicken by Bill Gifford (73% done as of this writing, according to my Kindle). It is basically a study of numerous attempts to find the secret to increasing the longevity of human life. So far most of what have seemed like promising options have proven to be not-so-promising after all. The extreme outer limit of human lifespan seems to be about 120 years, which doesn't surprise me. According to Genesis 6:3, "Then the LORD said, "My spirit shall not abide in mortals forever, for they are flesh; their days shall be one hundred twenty years."" While I don't believe everything in the Bible is to be taken literally, it seems to me the scientists may be fighting a losing battle. In fact, some have turned their attention from quantity to quality in their studies of aging, which seems to me to be a good move.

Reading this book during the COVID-19 stay-at-home order, I was lamenting the fact that I was gaining weight and having trouble mustering the motivation to do anything about it. Then I came across Chapter 9, "Phil vs Fat." There, among other evidence of the dangers of overweight and obesity, I came across this statement, "Indeed, there is growing evidence that our fat tissue itself might literally be shortening our lifespans." Talk about motivation! Taken as a whole, what this chapter is saying is that excess fat doesn't just hang around, it is actively trying to kill us. But, while that's an important message, it's not the point of this article. There is a Biblical connection, please read on.

As I pondered the idea that excess fat is harmful to our health, it me struck that the same principle applies to a myriad of life's circumstances. Often, when we have more of something than we need, not just food, it ends up doing more harm than good. Continued on next

When God fed the Israelites with manna in the wilderness, he told them to gather just enough for each day. Those who doubted God gathered excess, only to see it rot and become useless. While we should not be wasteful or arrogant, we should trust that, if we make proper use of the many blessings God provides, we will have sufficient for our needs, and often much to share, and sharing is one key to good stewardship.

During the stay-at-home order, St. Mark's was able to provide food and other necessities to several families, mostly participants from our Afterschool Program. Thanks to those who have been faithful in their offerings, we are able to be here for those who need whatever help we can provide.

Holding on to excess fat tissue, or anything else (like toilet tissue!) does no one any good and may be doing harm. God has put us in charge of a magnificent Creation that, in the end, belongs to God. Let's honor our Creator by honoring that Creation.

Pandemic Life in Romania

What a difference a month makes! A majority of people are masked, gloved and social distancing. Curfews enforced for seniors (only permitted outdoors between 11:00 AM and 1:00 PM) and non-medical personnel (10:00 PM to 6:00 AM). Fines issued for lack of identification and travel documents (up to \$4500), and are not appealable. Grocery selections are limited. Some days no bread, produce or meat is available. Cleaning products like disinfectant wipes, alcohol, hand sanitizer and bleach are non-existent. I asked my kids to send me 4 hairbands so I could make a mask out of a bandana, and the mail carrier said it would cost them over \$100 to mail a small envelope to me. The EEMN team sent me a manual for our weekly Ukraine training sessions, but it was rerouted to a post office on the other side of the city. I can get there by metro, but not during the pandemic lockdown. I will be charged for a storage fee when I am finally able to pick it up.

As expected, the EEMN short-term mission trips in eastern Europe have been cancelled. However, we are exploring ways to reformat a curriculum that respects social distancing and quarantine regulations. I heard from one of the shelters, and they are happily tucked away at their lavender farm, weeding, planting and enjoying the outdoors. The church that runs the other shelter is having technical difficulties, so they were unable to keep everyone informed through their website.

I have been enjoying Pastor Jim's sermons, and attending Pastor Karin's services online. It has been a blessing to hear God's message and be connected during the COVID-19 pandemic. It is good to feel some sense of unity, strength and love for all of humanity. We all relate to the same feelings of isolation, anxiety and boredom. Remember that Jesus was sent to experience these same feelings, and suffered so much more for our sake. May you continue to feel the immense love of Christ in your hearts. As a pastor recently said, "No social distancing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus!"




A prayer for Memorial Day

Afterschool Program

When Pastor Jim and I talked about the church sponsoring an Afterschool Program I never imagined so many families would be interested in their children enrolling. So many families wanted to take part in the program. The Afterschool Program offered homework help and a warm meal Monday through Thursday. As time went by, we learned that the children were all doing well in school. It was apparent that the parents looked forward to their children coming to the program daily. The parents as well as the children would constantly ask why we did not have the program on Fridays. The children were sad when we had to cancel the program due to religious needs of the church. The children as well as the parents looked forward to the program every day. The success of the program is due to the great staff of volunteers. The volunteers give selfishly of their time and talents to the program. The volunteers helped the children with homework, crafts, playtime and more.

Before each meal, the children take turns in leading the group in prayer. At the beginning the children were shy about volunteering but as time went on, the children would compete for a chance to lead the group in prayer. The child that prayed would also be the kitchen helper. Every evening at dismissal each child was given a few snacks to take home. We regularly did crafts with the children. No matter how elaborates the craft, the children were not asked to contribute to the cost. We made necklaces, Christmas ornaments and a host of other cool projects.

Each day the children were given a warm meal which was sponsored by the Central Pa Food bank. The children looked forward to the meals. Every Thursday we received donated pizzas from Little Caesars. Each child went home with at least one (1) pizza. We also received food from Sheetz from which the families could take what they want.

This program is new, and we have approximately 18 regular children between the ages of 4 and 13 yrs. I am also proud to report that we worked very hard with the 4-year-old children and each one is now able to write their name.

We have a waiting list in excess of 70 children wanting to attend the program. These families could not provide transportation to the program and Central Dauphin Transportation was unable to help this year due to struggles of their own.

During the state shut down, the volunteers have been assigned a couple of kids to stay in touch with. We have let the parents know that if we can be of assistance please let us know.

We have had a great first year despite the program being prematurely shutdown because of Covid-19. We all look forward to our next season of the program. Hopefully, we will have school transportation and will be able to extend the program to more children

This program is a success because Pastor Jim and his desire to help as many people as humanly possible. Pastor Jim is a great role model and a great servant of God. Without his insight and desire to make the world a better place, none of this would be possible.
