

This month my message is directed mostly to men, but for the women reading, it will be helpful to you as well since you must deal with us and sometimes even live with us. I have recently read several books written by athletes and other well-known, successful men in

which they give accounts of their childhood. Some of these men come from what we might consider a "normal" or "average" background. A surprising number, though, come from a background of poverty, (or at least low income) and, worse yet, abuse at the hands of misguided fathers or father-figures. These men who have been emotionally and physically abused are the fortunate ones in that they have overcome their horrendous upbringing and gone on to be successful in sports or business. I wonder, though, how many thousands more have not been so fortunate and are trapped in lives of dependency, violence, and abuse because of what they learned from some male role model about what a man should be.

All this got me thinking about Biblical examples of manhood, or manliness, or masculinity, or whatever other name we put on the way a man should behave and relate to his family and society. I then remembered that in *The Master Builders Bible for Men*, a special edition of the *Serendipity Bible* published especially for Lutheran Men in Mission, there is a section of passages for study on just that topic. There is a series of lessons on Masculinity subtitled, "Will the Real Jesus Please Stand Up?"

The six lessons in the series deal with The Divine Jesus, The Human Jesus, The Initiated Jesus, The Tough Jesus, The Tender Jesus, and the Triumphant Jesus. The passage at the opening of this article is from the reading for the lesson on The Divine Jesus. What we might call the "headline" for that section is "*God with us*" and it includes the story of Jesus' miraculous virgin birth. The other lessons in the series give an inside look at how the Divine Jesus was also human and set an example of how a Godly man should live.

I don't think we often see Jesus as a "manly man" in the modern sense. As many of the biographies I have read go, too many men grow up confused about what a "real man" is like. And it is not only in the poor neighborhoods and underprivileged communities that this confusion happens. Too many of our young men are growing up in homes where the male role model goes back and forth from loving, caring, and tender, to vengeful, angry, and mean. Add to that the all -too-pervasive message that a manly man is tough as nails, never shows emotion (unless it's anger) and is more willing to fight than to talk.

There is a question quoted at the beginning of *The Master Builders Bible* section on Masculinity: "*I get mixed messages about what a man should be – somewhere between macho and milquetoast. I know Jesus is God, but is he also someone I can look to as the ultimate man?*" I think it's time we realize the answer to that question is "Yes!" and begin to teach our young men that same lesson. And the young men aren't the only ones who need to get that message. The mothers, sisters, teachers, girlfriends, and other women in our lives also need to know that Jesus sets the ultimate example and hold them (us) accountable for their (our) behavior.

Jesus was, and is, the Son of God but he was also fully human. He was tempted to do wrong and to abuse his power and authority. He was tough when he needed to be to get his message across, but he was tender in dealing compassionately with the sick and hurting and in weeping over his friend Lazarus. He was strong enough to remain faithful to his Father, and to us, even to the point of death and then triumphantly rose from the grave to make his earthly mission complete. None of us is the Son of God, but some of us sometimes act like we think we are. A real man is not a manly man, he is a Godly man. The life we live and the example we set should be one our children and families clearly appreciate, not one they are confused by. With so many conflicting images of manhood in our society, it is time for Christian men to set the example and lead the way. And ladies, the manly man in me hates to admit it, but the Godly man must; we can't do it without your help.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,



#### LOAD-OUT!

Well, the rollercoaster ride is over. Eight weeks of moving the kids to their own apartment is 99% done. Mulling over 22 years of accumulated memories are now purged. The highs of receiving house bids and the lows of rejected offers are complete. Buyer negotiations are finalized. My airline tickets are purchased. It's time to move on.

Things are bittersweet. I've encountered a lot of opposition from friends and family to the tune of, "how can you leave everything (us) behind," and "who will take care of this now, and "why would you want to give all 'this' up?" My response is, "Here I am, Lord. Send me!" I am relinquishing my 30+ years of management experience. I am NOT in charge here, God is. God is calling me to spread the gospel, and I am not hanging up on His call.

My living arrangements have changed due to Romanian governmental monitoring of the Ana family's household. They receive a small subsidy in order to provide 24-hour care for Cristina (Eugen's older sister) who became paraplegic in her early 20's. The government does not believe I would be staying in their apartment rent free and would therefore take away Cristina's aid. Fortunately, Mrs. Ana's nephew has an apartment vacancy, and is willing to rent it to me at <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of the cost. It still amounts to about \$300/month plus utilities, but it is a better cost alternative. And, he speaks English!

Besides ministering to the 25+ families that I have already met, I will be volunteering weekly at a women's shelter for victims of human trafficking. She is willing to help me through the extended visa process so I can remain in Romania for 9 months and come back to the USA for 3 months. I will be teaching these teenage women English, and they will reciprocate in Romanian.

I look forward to a much more simplistic lifestyle. I don't need to have tv and internet 24/7. I don't need that latest gadget or tech device. And believe it or not, I was able to give up 95% of my bling, which LYF was able to sell and provide funds for youth to attend retreats and mission trips. Don't get me wrong, I will certainly miss many of those things. I just realize that I don't NEED those amenities. Please continue to keep my family and me in your prayers. Make time for the Lord!
