So it was that for an entire year they met with the church and taught a great many people, and it was in Antioch that the disciples were first called "Christians." Acts 11:26b, NRSV

Regardless of one's sentiments toward social media, something we have learned from the rapid growth of Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and others is the importance of community. Now an online, virtual community is not the same as the community my generation grew up with in which we interacted with one another physically, but it is a community nonetheless. Human nature being what it is, we need community. In Genesis we read how God created humans to live in community with God first, then with other human beings; "It is not good that man (or woman) should be alone" (Genesis 2:18). Jesus recognized the importance of community when he gathered the disciples into a close-knit group to carry on his ministry and the Apostles knew how important community was when they formed the church that Jesus promised he would build on the rock of the Gospel. What set these communities apart from other groups and organizations is that they were formed, not only for their own benefit, but mostly for the benefit of others. That is, their purpose was not to maintain the status quo, but to reach out in mission to a world in need.

Just as the Church is a community within the larger community of humankind, congregations like St. Mark's are communities within the larger community of the Church. And, like those Biblical communities mentioned above, we exist not just for ourselves but for the benefit of others; to help when we can, offer support where we can, and to reach out in mission with the Good News of Jesus Christ. I believe St. Mark's stands at a crossroads of our history and our future. We must decide if we are going to be a mission congregation or a maintenance congregation.

I recently had to give up my beloved 2004 Jeep Liberty, which had served me faithfully for 12 years, and get a new vehicle. Although I still loved that old Jeep, the cost of maintaining it had become impractical, (not to mention the anxiety of wondering what would fail next and when.) I now have a dependable vehicle that I like very much, but I had to let go of one I had been comfortable with for a long time. Congregations, too, can reach a point where "maintenance" becomes costly. Not being willing to give up at least some of the familiar and embrace something new can lead to dwindling attendance, lack of finances, and overall loss of vitality as those seeking a mission oriented community will find it in other places.

I expressed some of these thoughts recently at our Congregation Council meeting. I made it clear that I feel that I am called to lead a congregation more geared toward mission than maintenance. Most, if not all, of the Council seemed to feel the same way. While it is very important that we take care of one another who are already a part of this community,

we must also find ways to be a community that is open, inviting, and accepting of others who are seeking a faith community that will enhance their lives and bring them the Good News they crave.

At a recent meeting of the Rostered Leaders of the Harrisburg Conference of the Lower Susquehanna Synod, we were informed that in the next ten years 30-40 congregations in our Synod are likely to close. Most of those congregations will likely be of the "maintenance" variety; more determined to maintain "the way we've always done it" than to embrace new ideas, new ways of doing things, and, as a result, new members. While St. Mark's is currently a vital, and even growing, congregation, we must not be lulled into thinking we cannot become one of those 30-40 that are no longer here a decade from now.

As we prepare to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, we look back on 234 years of our own history, first as Shoop's Lutheran Church then, since 1958, as St. Mark Evangelical Lutheran Church. As part of our Reformation observance, we will be asking members to do something we haven't asked of them for a long time; make a commitment of time, talent, and/or finances to the future of our church. The Reformation, sparked in large part by Martin Luther's disappointment with the Church of his day, ended up changing the course of history. I'm sure that much has changed in the 234 years of Shoop's/St. Mark's history as well. Despite all the changes, and even upheaval, the church has survived. Perhaps it has been *because* of the changes and upheaval that the church has survived.

If we choose, by intent or by default, to be a maintenance oriented congregation, I guess that will be OK. I believe a mission oriented congregation, though, is more consistent with the model of a Biblical community, and more likely to be a community in which people will be involved, active, and ultimately, to hear and live the Good News. The choice is ours.
