"The harvest is bigger than you can imagine". More and more we are finding those words of Jesus to be true for us here at St. Mark's. You may be more familiar with the traditional translation, "The Harvest is plentiful", but I think a harvest that is **bigger than we can imagine** is more like the truth. Many of the things that are now a part of our ministry were once unimaginable or, at best, imaginable but never thought possible.

We now have an Alternative style worship service every month that is often as well attended as our traditional services. This style of worship with contemporary music, less formal atmosphere and meeting in the Fellowship hall instead of the nave was often talked about, sometimes tried, but now is successful in reaching a new "audience" with the Gospel. The second Sunday of the month, when The Table, our alternative worship, is offered, our attendance is consistently higher than other Sundays. This tells me that we are reaching new people, not just the same crowd at a different time. Thanks to Bennett Williams, our Minister of Contemporary Worship and his team for making "The Table" a success.

There are some things in our traditional worship that are also new or recently revived. One in particular is our Advent Choir. This group of elementary school (and younger) students are doing an amazing job of communicating the Gospel with simple yet meaningful music. While not exactly new, the Bell Choir and Choir Chimes seem to be always improving and finding new ways to enhance our worship, as well as the Chancel Choir, which does an extraordinary job. Thanks to Joyce Van Nieuwkuyk and the musicians and singers who make out traditional worship special.

A new endeavor that hasn't even begun yet as I write this is the St. Mark's Afterschool Program. This is another ministry that has been in the imagination of several of us for some time and is finally coming to fruition. We will serve a hot meal, provided by the Central PA Food Bank, to the children of our neighborhood Monday thru Thursday. Plans also include homework help, a running/fitness program, arts and crafts, and perhaps other activities as we see the need. Paulette Beverly has been the driving force behind this program along with Molly Stanton, the Social Services Ministry, and others. The program kicks off October 7.

In addition to these new and revived ministries, there are many other things happening here, some ongoing, some new, some still in the planning stages, and some still in someone's imagination.

With all this activity, you can see the applicability of the second part of Jesus' saying, "but there are few workers", or "the workers are few." It's not so much that there are only a few people active, but that the active are few in relation to the possibilities of the harvest. There are opportunities for everyone to serve in some way in reaching the unimaginable numbers of people that could be reached with the Gospel message, both in word and deed. Acolytes, band members, choir members, drivers, event planners, food servers, greeters, handipeople, instructors, Junior youth, knitters, lectors, musicians, note-senders, offering counters, pianists, quilters, readers, singers, typists, ____ vegetable growers, writers, xylophone players, yard workers, and zither players are all possible ways to become one of the much-needed workers in the church.

You may have noticed that the list above has a job for every letter of the alphabet. "The only thing missing", as the saying goes, "is U"! If you are not currently involved in some ministry of the church in some way, please take a little time to prayerfully consider how you might become one of the workers so desperately needed to help bring in the unimaginable harvest. You may have something in mind that we have not even thought of yet. You may want to do, or already be doing, something behind the scenes to help us be the church God is calling us to be. We have, and greatly appreciate, the many workers we already have, but still we are pleading with the Lord of the harvest to send out workers for his harvest. Imagine the possibilities!


