"Time is a gift of God's creation. People order time in various ways, often based on the rhythms of nature. The church organizes time by the church year. It tells the story of God, who is beyond time, acting in history – above all through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

The church year includes the Christmas and Easter cycles of seasons and the periods of time after Epiphany and after Pentecost. The Christmas cycle begins with the first Sunday of Advent, four Sundays before December 25, and concludes with the Epiphany of Our Lord on January 6. The Easter cycle begins with Ash Wednesday forty days before Easter and concludes with the Day of Pentecost on the fiftieth day of Easter. The weekly progression of Sundays characterizes the Time after Epiphany and the Time after Pentecost." *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 13, "The Church Year"

The church year is, in many ways, a reflection of the cycle of life we see repeated daily, weekly, yearly and over the course of a whole lifetime. That cycle includes the anticipation of things yet to come, the celebration of joy realized, the revelation of the wonders of life, the dark times of suffering and sacrifice, the joy of new life, and the everyday happenings and events that occur in between.

As I write this, we are nearing the end of the Epiphany season, culminating in the Transfiguration of Our Lord. This is a high point of the Gospels, both literally and figuratively as from the mountaintop Jesus and his followers head down to Jerusalem and the cross. We travel together through the somber season of Lent looking forward to the celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord on Easter Sunday. From the smallest moments of our lives to the span of a whole lifetime we see the pattern of up, down,

anticipation, fear, apprehension and joy repeated over and over. That realization can be both disconcerting and comforting; disconcerting due to the knowledge that life will never be a continuous "bed of roses", but comforting in the reassurance that the brighter days, the blooms of spring, and new life in Christ are yet to come. And, as we learn from the church year, the future God has to offer through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus is greater than any dark time we might experience.

The church, like the world around us, has been through some trying times over the past two years. We have experienced precautions, cancellations and yes, even some wonderful celebrations like Christmas Eve. Shortly following that celebration, though, we saw a surge in COVID cases in the general population that prompted a return to more cautious gatherings once again. Now, we see COVID trending down again and are looking forward to a more traditional observance of Lent and a revitalized celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord, followed by a year of ministry to our members and community refreshed by the time away.

The Israelites spent 40 years wandering in the wilderness, guided and protected by the Lord, to find new freedom and new life in the Promised Land. Jesus spent 40 days in the desert, hungry, thirsty, and being tempted by the Devil. Sustained by the Heavenly Father and rooted in his faithfulness to God and to us, Jesus emerged from his ordeal to begin a ministry that would bring life, hope, and salvation to all the world. We have spent the better part of two years negotiating the Wilderness of Pandemic, into what Promised Land, what mission and ministry, what new life will we emerge? The coming Forty Days of Lent will, in many ways, be representative of our journey of the past two years. It will be a time for us to remember what we have been through and how it relates to the wilderness journeys of our ancestors. It will also be a time to remember the cycle that will bring us to joy, freedom, and renewed mission and ministry. I hope you will join us, both through the wilderness and in the emerging joy. While we pray for a return to greater numbers at in-person worship and fellowship, we will continue to reach by social media, internet, and any other we can to bring the Gospel to as many people as possible.

However, you travel with us, we thank you for your support of our mission and ministry in whatever way you are able offer it. "Time is a gift of God's creation." Let us make the best use of that time that we can as we look forward to the eternal, glorious, cycle of life that lies ahead.

Connected

This is an excerpt from a recent bible study which explored our responsibility when we know what is right, yet choose to do what is wrong.

[[A young woman was walking on a mountain trail. As she climbed up and it was cold, a snake approached her and said, "Please take me in your arms because I am freezing. The girl replied, "I can't do that." The serpent insisted, "Oh please, warm me up." Eventually, the girl gave in and said, "Nest under my coat." The serpent slipped under her coat and warmed up, and the girl thought everything was fine. Suddenly, the serpent bit the girl. She pulled him out from under her coat and threw him away, saying, "I trusted you. Why did I get bit?" The serpent replied, "You knew what I was when you lifted me up from below."]

[If we flirt with the devil we will always be hurt. If we refuse to dress with the robe of praise because we do not feel like praising the Lord or we do not want to, we will end up in dangerous situations. We will open the door to bigger problems, which can have serious consequences. Immediately resist the devil. Be well balanced (tempered, with awake mind), vigilant and cautious all the time; for your enemy, the devil, roars (with hunger) as a lion looking for whom he may devour. Oppose him strong in faith (resist right from the beginning), being rooted, grounded, strong, steadfast and determined, knowing that the brothers (the whole Body of Christ) in the world pass through those (identical) sufferings as you. 1 Peter 5:8-9 (AMP)]]

It's a hard lesson. Temptations bombard our daily lives and give us a false sense of immortality. **I'll do it, just this once. One more time. One more bite. I had one drink, one hit, one blow. This is my last one.** Since I am immersed in field work once again, I am sensitive to the struggles of the women and children I serve. The exposure to predators, sexual exploitation, drug use, alcohol abuse, poverty, broken families and bullying exist, just like in the USA. The biggest difference is that there are no social supports here. No group meetings, no sponsors, no 1-800 hotlines, and many with no belief in Christ.

Dr. Kari Vo recently wrote a devotion that states in part,

Jesus is your support. It doesn't matter if you're not feeling it – I doubt trees "feel" the water at their roots all the time, either! But you are connected to Him, and He to you – and His life flows through you. Jesus is your Strength and your life, and He will see you through.

May you remain grounded in faith and steadfast in resisting temptations. You are always connected to Christ.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF PERSONAL CARE KITS

SOME IMPORTANT GUIDELINES TO REMEMBER • Be sure to shop for light- or medium -weight towels, which are easier for Kit recipients to hand wash and air dry, take up less storage space and are considerably less expensive than the fluffier towels we may prefer to use. • Bath towels vary in size. The 52" X 27" size listed in the guidelines is the maximum size. 20" x 40" is a good guideline for a minimum size. • Please give new items only. • Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages or your group's name. • Please do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage. • Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. • All items should be new and in good condition. • Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags. **NO TOOTHPASTE.**

INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING IN EACH PERSONAL CARE KIT

ONE light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color recommended

TWO or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping

ONE adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging*

ONE sturdy comb, remove packaging

ONE metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

*Toothbrush mufti-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope; no plastic bags or wrap

HOW TO PACK YOUR PROJECT PROMISE KITS • Fold the towel in half. Place the rest of the items in the towel, fold and roll so nothing falls out, and secure with yarn, ribbon, string or rubber bands. • Pack completed Kits, like items together, in boxes. Label contents in LARGE, BLOCK LETTERS on the outside of the boxes. • Use strong cartons secured with packing tape, not to exceed 40 pounds. • Do not use plastic or paper bags to pack donations. • Include the name and address of your group or congregation on each box and label the contents
