"Be still, and know that I am God! I am exalted among the nations; I am exalted in the earth." The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge." Psalm 46:10-11 (NRSV)

Is it just me, or does it seem like people these days are less patient, more tense, always in a hurry, often irritable for little or no reason and less tolerant of people or events that "invade" their lives?

Some blame the fast pace of society these days. Others complain of how busy they always seem to be. Many feel that others are making unfair demands on their time or that they are confronted with trivial matters by trivial people who should be able to do more for themselves. This impatience, irritability and intolerance can lead to frustration, arguments, broken relationships, and may even be a contributing factor in some of the violence that pervades our daily news.

I've said before that, even though I cannot prove cause and effect, it seems to me that the farther people get from God, as evidenced in lagging attendance at church services and activities, the worse the social environment becomes. The church is here to reassure not only its members but society as a whole that God is ultimately in control, Jesus offers us peace beyond understanding, at that the Holy Spirit is at work even as much of the world works against it.

Words like those above from Psalm 46 have been a reminder to all people throughout the ages that God knows us, God loves us, and that, given time and a welcoming heart and mind, God will help us feel at peace no matter the circumstances. Throughout the Bible, in both the Old Testament and the New Testament we hear words of reassurance and peace. "Yea, though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil." "So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them." "My peace I give to you, my peace I leave with you." "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you." When we greet each other with the Peace in church services, we pray for one another to know the peace and love that come from God through us to the world. This is the peace

that seems to be lacking in so much of society today.

Some of the people who know me have described me, and I often think of myself as "a laid-back kind of guy." That is somewhat ironic because, as a teenager and young adult, I often displayed the short temper and impatience I must have inherited from my father. (I once caught him searching through the flower bed for tools he had flung there while trying to fix the car. When I asked what he was doing he rather brusquely replied, "Go in the house and leave me alone." Fortunately, his demeanor 90% of the time was more joker than grump, but when we witnessed that 10%, we left him alone to cool off!) As I matured, though, I began to see the futility of impatience and adopted more of my mother's attitude of tolerance and patience, and my wife says it's a good thing I did!

I am well aware that my laid-back attitude can be frustrating to people working with me, but for the most part it has served me well. I find time to get the important things done and am often able to deal with people calmly and gently when others have given up in frustration. While I am not averse to reminders, and even prodding at times, I have found that what often seems like foot dragging to my more rambunctious friends and coworkers turns out to be an opportunity for the right people and/or circumstances to come about for something meaningful to be done. Be it coincidence or Divine Intervention, it works for me (usually). I am sure I have missed some opportunities by not acting promptly, and I am willing to accept that. I have faith that, if it is truly important, God, my wife, or someone else will move me to action.

In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus says, "do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by worrying can add a single hour to your span of life...But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." Be still and know that God is God (and you're not!)

Communion Munchos?

I rarely remember my dreams, but this one is a doozy that I would like to share with you!

While stateside, I would regularly assist in distributing communion to the homebound, and occasionally assist during worship services. Maundy Thursday has a deeply special meaning for me, and I fondly remember many discussions with friends and family about the significance of celebrating communion.

In my dream, I was assisting a pastor during the communion distribution. I remember the altar area being elevated and finished with parquet flooring. As I raised the eucharist to give to the pastor, I remember it being of unusual texture and non-uniform shaped (more like an amoeba instead of a circular wafer), and slightly mauve in color. The pastor was giving direction to other assistants at the rail and we distributed these "munchos" as the body of Christ.

When it came time to distribute the wine, the carafe contained honey with an Egyptian-looking metal spork. When I stirred the honey to investigate the material, there were a few sugar ants roaming around. I showed my discovery to the pastor who nodded like this is a normal occurrence and then moved the spork to avoid the ants and distribute to the waiting assistants. I remember feeling a bit anxious, thinking, what if I accidently include an ant in a sporkful?

I woke up and recalled what I had for dinner the previous night that may have triggered such a crazy dream. I had nothing unusual, but I did recall a pastor once telling me that sometimes in the mission field you have to improvise because you may not have bread and wine, but maybe only water or fish. A couple of internet searches suggested that dreaming about the inside of a church means I am seeking spiritual enlightenment and guidance (aren't we all). Dreaming about communion specifically signifies an inner conflict between material and spiritual worlds and between values and feelings (again, isn't this a constant in our lives because of our capacity for free will?) I will never know what this silly dream really means, but I do know that God has a sense of humor and will continue to walk with me in my journey.

And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:7)
