<u>Matthew 8:12</u> "while the heirs of the kingdom will be thrown into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

Matthew 13:42 "and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

Matthew 13:50 "and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

<u>Matthew 22:13</u> "Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand and foot, and throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

Matthew 24:51 "He will cut him in pieces and put him with the hypocrites, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

<u>Matthew 25:30</u> "As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

The verses above are all from the Gospel of Matthew. During the past year, as I have studied and preached on this Gospel, I have come to believe that Matthew must have been dealing with a congregation or congregations that needed to have "the fear of God" put in them. The phrase, "weeping and gnashing of teeth" is only found seven times in the whole Bible, and six of those are in Matthew. Matthew seems to want to remind us that, along with the privilege of receiving the gift of faith and being recipients of salvation by God's grace, we have some responsibility to respond to that gift and privilege in ways that show our great thankfulness and deep gratitude. The reminder of judgement, I think, is meant to show us that we will be held accountable for our responsiveness.

Responsibility and accountability are topics that were at the top of the list at our recent Ministry

Did you know that last year NutriPacks impacted the lives of over 800 food insecure students within the Central Dauphin School District? The support provided by NutriPacks proved to be vital during the ongoing economic uncertainty affecting the entire country. The stability of many of our already financially distressed families led us to consider ways to assist them throughout the summer months, resulting in our first summer food program one year ago. Unfortunately, due to our own fluctuating financial status, this highly successful and much needed summer initiative was not a part of our program this year. The need to meet the difficulties of rising prices at the grocery stores brought hundreds of families to our distribution center every week. As you know, hunger does not take the summer off...but sadly we had no choice but to close our doors.

NutriPacks, a non-profit organization, is a project of the Panther Ram Foundation and operates without paid employees. The successful execution of Nutripacks is organized by a team of 10 advisory board members. The process of food distribution to families is contingent on 200 volunteers. As such, we are reaching out to churches and congregations within our community to ask if you would be willing to support us through monetary donations and volunteers. Along with the necessary volunteer support, monetary donations are VITAL. Donations allow students to receive a backpack filled with nutritious food items for the weekend, when children do not have access to food provided by our schools. Our partnership with The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank in Middletown allows us to provide nourishing meals at an affordable cost. Your monetary donation directly assists with feeding a family in this time of need. For the cost of a bag of potato chips or a cup of coffee at a specialty shop, you could ensure that a child has adequate food over the weekend.

Knowing that our community partners are KEY to the continuance of this necessary program, we are hopeful that you will consider donating and/ or provide volunteers. Enclosed is our brochure that provides additional information. We also ask that you consider sharing this letter with any community organization that uses your church/facility throughout the year. We hope to count on your support to continue our mission to feed all food insecure children in our community. Please know that no contribution is too small to make a difference.

Man: But on what else do you find hope?

Woman: On the redemption of Jesus Christ. But God demonstrates His own love for us in this: while were still sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8)

Why do I do mission work? Because God called me to show others how much He loves me.

Where do I find hope? From reading the bible every day, God speaks to me to guide my journey.

I know through Him that I can do this because He gives me strength.

Pray for purpose. Listen to what He is calling you to do. Answer Him!

But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect... (1 Peter 3:15)

I hope everyone is having a great summer! We have wrapped up our Theme for the year, I Am Alive! With our final few meetings, had youth sunday breakfast church, and went to Confirmation Camp!

In wrapping up our year of youth group meetings, we ended the year with a joint meeting with SPYG Mechanicsburg, who joined us for a final meeting about being Alive in Christ. Overall, I think our theme for the year was very well received. It was the first theme in a few years that was overarchingly positive in nature (not that past themes were not positive. But themes like Fear Not and Step Into It were more action based), talking about what feeds us, nourishes us, makes us feel alive, makes us happy. What makes us feel close to one another and to God? After so many years of COVID canceling events, making life insular, and focusing on the bad things in society, I think talking about these themes really resonated with the group, that we are allowed to feel alive in Christ, while still being loving towards our neighbors and those affected by COVID.

A huge thank you to everyone who attended Youth Sunday and our Breakfast Church service! And an even bigger thank you to the Fellowship Committee who worked with us to get breakfast ready and the fellowship hall setup for the service! We could not have done it without you! Or everyone who brought a breakfast casserole!! We have gotten a lot of positive feedback on the service and we think it may be an annual thing, doing Youth Sunday as Breakfast church. In addition, it sounds like we, as a congregation, may want to have a breakfast/meal church even more often than that! I think the youth group can certainly facilitate 1 or 2 services like that per year, but we'll have to share that load if we end up moving to a quarterly meal church service or more. Confirmation Camp has come and gone! We had campers, counselors, and staff all attending Confirmation Camp. I could not be more proud of our impact on the community!

Looking forward to the rest of the summer (I am writing this on Thursday, June 29th), we have two more trips to the Wittel Farm - July 1st and August 12th. These events are open to all! We also have Lake Break coming up the first weekend of August. This is our end of year Summer Retreat. We had planned this for last year, but we ended up canceling the trip when I caught COVID right before the trip. We are excited to finally have this event for the first time! We also have the Annual Flea Market Fundraiser coming up on July 8th!

Beyond that, we are looking forward to the next year of youth ministry and are

getting planning underway for the theme, meetings, retreats, and events! Later this summer there is the REVIVE Youthworkers retreat at Camp Nawakwa, put on by the Synod Office for Youth Ministry and Faith Formation (I am actually a presenter at the retreat). I am extending the invitation to our active youth group advisors to attend this event to receive some continuing education on youth ministry in today's age, as well as Trauma-Informed Care. Hopefully a few are able to attend! If anyone is interested in learning more about this retreat and thinks they may want to be a part of it as well, just let me know! It is August 18-20 at Camp Nawakwa.

Church Camp—Pastor Jan Mills

In the May issue of the Parish Post, Pastor Jim wrote a wonderful article highlighting the benefits church camp can have on people. Like he mentioned in the article, many pastors and other church professionals will tell you how church camp influenced their call to a Christian vocation. I am one of those people.

As I write this, I am at Camp Nawakwa for Elder Camp. I have never outgrown the desire to be part of outdoor ministries. As a small child, our family went to Family Camp at Rainbow Trail Lutheran Camp in Colorado. As I grew, I attended Rainbow Trail as a youth until I graduated from high school. And then I was a counselor at Rainbow Trail.

After marriage and the birth of our children, I urged, well maybe nagged would be a better word, for my husband and I to take our children to Camp Nawakwa for family camp. He grumbled at first, and finally said, "Ok, one time!" Interestingly, by Wednesday of Family Camp, he was asking "When do we sign up for next year?" One year, when there had been a very long dry spell, the Family Campers prayed for rain at each meal, at morning Bible Study and at Vespers. On Wednesday of that week, the sky opened up and it poured all day! My husband said, "if I ever get really sick, I want this group praying for me!"

Three of our children worked at Camp Nawakwa for a few years each. One of those also worked at Camp Kirchenwald. I remember at the end of one summer, my daughter dreaded going back to college. She said people at camp were so accepting, and non-judgmental of everyone, and at college, she felt she had to dress right and act right, etc.

As our children grew, married, and had children of their own, I began taking the grandchildren to Family Camp. They called it Grandma Camp. They would start asking around Christmastime if we were doing Grandma Camp. For about 20 years, we've done Grandma Camp. And 3 years ago, I had the privilege of baptizing my two youngest grandchildren at Family Camp.

To say church camp has had an influence on me and my family would be a gross understatement. Church camp has opportunities for all ages. I'm at Elder Camp now. We have Bible study in the morning and can enjoy crafts, the pool, fellowship, and even a nap in the afternoon. During the winter months there are also opportunities for craft weekends, book study weekends, etc.

I don't know what my life would have been like without church camp. I remember hearing Mike Youse, the director of the Lutheran Camping Corporation say one time, "When you send your child to soccer camp, you expect them to come home a better soccer player. When you send your child to church camp, they come home a better disciple." This is most certainly true.

2023 Synod Notes and Observations - Joe Boslett

As we discussed this morning after church service, I wanted to share some of my thoughts on the Synod proceedings of Friday and Saturday at Trinity Lutheran Church. As you were present for most of the morning session, I am not going to repeat anything of that part of the program. Summarizing:

- lots of people over 400 and about 85% of the crowd was more than over 30 years of age which they determined from the voting questionnaire...but well mannered and very attentive for large group
- great organization of the entire process from parking, to registration, activities, meeting management, and program functions
- facilities most adequate for handling the crowd and the event
- having ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton in attendance was most impressive considering she could have been at any one of 20 other Synod Assemblies
- LSS Bishop James Dunlop was the consummate host/moderator he handed a number of glichy issues during the business meeting with grace and aplomb
- Deacon Kristen Barnes, chaplain, did good service throughout the proceedings
- Rev. Jeffrey Compton, necrologist, delivering the homily, was if you listened to him closely the most evocative speaker about pastors being real people...this I know directly from Emmor's uncle and the time just he and I spent together.
- the business meeting went better than I expected although it was one of the major reasons for the Assembly and the most controversial issue was over the use of an 'and' or 'or' in a statement.

- I was impressed with all the activities the LSS supports from disaster aid, refugee and immigration services, Lutherans in Ukraine, Penn State students (we even did a hearty "We are" cheer for Bishop Eaton), international projects (schools, churches, water), to assistance here at home with divinity students and youth camps.
- proud of the fact that LSS is taking the lead in minority issues, people of color, people whose first language is not English, getting youth involved, and LBGQ community.

A singular experience and I feel good about being a Lutheran although my Presbyterian roots are deep. Thank the Lord we are not too far apart in our theology. Grace and Promise means so much more after being part of this gathering. Thank you for the opportunity. God bless us all, Pastor.

Cultural Differences

James 4:11-12 Brothers and sisters, do not slander one another. Anyone who speaks against a brother or sister or judges them speaks against the law and judges it. When you judge the law, you are not keeping it, but sitting in judgment on it. 12 There is only one Lawgiver and Judge, the

one who is able to save and destroy. But you—who are you to judge your neighbor? We are all human, and as humans, we are sinners. Not a day passes without sin. We hurt ourselves and each other intentionally and non-intentionally. Words can lift us up, or crush our spirits in seconds. In Asian culture, we have a saying known as "losing face." It means that someone has publicly shamed another, which brings dishonor to the entire family. In some cases, it means a death sentence to the person being shamed. I have "lost face" several times in USA, and again recently in Romania. Not only was I humiliated in public, but I was told that God doesn't love me because of my actions. That false statement hurt me the most, and caused inconsolable pain. I know it will be difficult for me to encounter my accuser in the future. I pray the Holy Spirit swiftly guides my words when that time comes to fruition.

Matthew 18:15 (Jesus said,) "If your brother or sister sins, go and point out their fault, just between the two of you. If they listen to you, you have won them over."

Our children learned how the prophet Samuel had to find David to anoint him as king. From 1 Samuel 16:7, "But the LORD said to Samuel, "Do not consider his appearance or his height, for I have rejected him. The LORD does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart."

Dear Lord, I humbly come before You, seeking inner strength and resilience in the face of humiliation and shame. Help me to guard my heart against the hurtful words and opinions of others. Grant me the confidence to stay true to myself and not be swayed by the negativity around me. Fill me with Your love and peace, knowing that Your opinion of me is what truly matters. Amen.
