From the Partor

We've all experienced the phenomenon of the "brainworm", a song that gets stuck in our head and just won't go away. Well, for some time recently I have awakened in the morning with the song "You Can Do Magic" by the group America ringing in my ears. It wasn't the whole song, because I don't know the whole song, but the repetition of the opening verses in my head every morning got me to thinking there must be some significance to it. (Of course, I have since

looked up the lyrics, which reinforced my feeling.)

I learned from Bennett Williams, who is now Coordinator of Music Ministry at St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Middletown (as well as part of my extended family as uncle to my son-in-law) that we can often find spiritual meaning in contemporary music if we see the object of love and affection as our love for God and/or Jesus' love for us. My conversations with Bennett reinforced something that has been know by worshippers of God for centuries. For example, the Song of Solomon, which dates as far back as the Fourth Century B.C. never mentions God or religious practices, yet it is included in scripture. The book, written in verse form, opens with the words,

"Let him kiss me with the kisses of his mouth.! For your love is better than wine, your anointing oils are fragrant, Your name is perfume poured out; therefore the Maidens love you."

And it gets juicier from there!

According to *The Story of Christian Music* by Andrew Wilson-Dickinson, Martin Luther felt that "the profane could be made sacred by encouraging new and wholesome associations." Luther himself said:

"Street songs, knightly and miners' songs (the contemporary music of the Middle Ages) changed in a Christian, moral, and ethical manner, in order that the evil, vexatious melodies, the useless and shameful songs to be sung in the streets, fields, houses, and elsewhere, may lose their bad effects if they can have good, useful Christian texts and words."

I love the traditional hymns of our worship, but since we don't hear those hymns often outside of the church walls, I think it's good to be able to reinterpret so-called "popular" music in the context of our Christian faith. Which brings me back to my meditation on the song, "You Can Do Magic."

I finally decided to look up the lyrics and found that many of the thoughts expressed in that song were, in fact, quite fitting to a Christian who had come to believe in love and Jesus. It's not a perfect correlation, but enough that when I hear that song from now on, whether actually or in my mind's ear, I will think of it differently, as it pertains to my own experience of faith formation. Consider the first two verses:

I never believed in things that I couldn't see I said if I can't feel it then how can it be No, no magic could happen to me And then I saw you

I couldn't believe it, you took my heart I couldn't retrieve it, said to myself What's it all about Now I know there can be no doubt

Have you heard the story of Doubting Thomas? If not, read John 20:24-29. The words of this song might have come straight from the lips of Thomas himself.

Loving the Lord with all our heart, mind, soul, and strength means that our faith permeates every aspect of our lives, music included. Next time you get one of those tunes, or a poem, or whatever, in your head that just won't go away, ponder it in the context of your faith. God may be using a "brainworm" to get your attention.

Greetings,

Did you know that last year NutriPacks impacted the lives of over 800 food insecure students within the Central Dauphin school district? The support provided by NutriPacks proved to be vital during the economic uncertainty affecting the entire country. The stability of many of our already financially distressed families led us to initiate our first summer food program. Advisory board members, along with an amazing group of volunteers, gave up fifteen weeks of their summer to make sure our families continued to have fresh and nutritious food. The response was overwhelming! The need to meet the difficulties of rising prices at the grocery store brought hundreds of families to our distribution center every week. As you know, hunger does not take the summer off and neither does NutriPacks!

As we embark on the new challenges that face our country this coming year, we wish to be fully prepared to continue supporting our families and students. We anticipate serving approximately 1000 students. WITH YOUR HELP we will provide food for the needlest students of Central Dauphin and attempt to alleviate some of the burden already placed on their families during this difficult time.

NutriPacks, a non-profit organization, is a project of the Panther Ram Foundation and operates without paid employees. The successful execution of NutriPacks is organized by a team of 10 advisory board members. The process of food distribution to families is contingent on approximately 200 volunteers. As such, we are reaching out to churches within our community to ask if you would be willing to support us through monetary donations and volunteers. Along with the necessary volunteer support, monetary donations are VITAL. Donations allow for students to receive a backpack filled with nutritious food items that costs our program merely \$10.00 per student. Our partnership with The Central Pennsylvania Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank in Middletown, allows us to provide nourishing meals at an affordable cost. Your monetary donation directly assists with feeding a family in this time of need! For the cost of a bag of potato chips, or a cup of coffee at a specialty shop, you could ensure that a child has adequate food over the weekend.

Knowing that our community partners are key to the continuance of this necessary program, we are hopeful that you will consider donating and/or provide volunteers. Enclosed is our brochure that provides additional information. We also ask that you consider sharing this letter with any community organization that uses your church/facility throughout the year. We hope to count on your support to continue our mission to feed all food insecure children in our community. Please know that no contribution is too small to make a difference.

Dear Friends of the Food Pantry:

On behalf of the Ecumenical Food Pantry and those who benefit from your generosity, thank you for the VBS donation of 50 lbs. of groceries and \$155.00 received in August 2022.

Last year the Food Pantry provided a three-day supply of food to approximately 1000 family members every month totaling about 74,300 meals. This equates to a distribution of 89,236 pounds of food. Many served by the Pantry are children and adolescents.

We are open five days a week from 9:30-12:30 PM, supported by dedicated volunteers. The Pantry is also open the third Saturday of each month from 9:30-12:30. These expanded hours further enhance our customer's access to the Pantry.

#### JOIN US FOR OUR 50TH-YEAR CELEBRATION!

We're having a 50th-year Celebration for the pantry on September 17th from 2:00 to 4:00, located at Messiah Lutheran Church, 901 N 6th St., Harrisburg, PA, 17102. We are celebrating 50 years of service to the Harrisburg and surrounding area communities. The food pantry initially began in response to the community's needs after the devastating effects of Hurricane Agnes in 1972. The celebration will honor the many Pantry volunteers and we are inviting the community to celebrate with us. We plan to provide food, beverages, games, music, and tours of the facility.

Without generous contributions and numerous volunteers supporting the Pantry, we would not be able to provide emergency food assistance to the greater Harrisburg community five days per week.

We thank you for your commitment and generosity and hope that you will continue to support the Ecumenical Food Pantry.

Who is your focal point as you anticipate the cooler weather, change in the leaves, and preparations for winter? Of course, you know in your heart that you should always focus on Him, but how often do we consciously put God first?

It's not easy. As humans we are basically self-centered as a survival mechanism. But what if we could explore the flip side and strive to be God-centered? We've all seen the cliché, "What Would Jesus Do?" (WWJD).

Excerpt from 2 Corinthians 5:17-20 (The Message): All this comes from the God who settled the relationship between us and him, and then called us to settle our relationships with each other...God has given us the task of telling everyone what he is doing. We're Christ's representatives. God uses us to persuade men and women to drop their differences and enter God's work of making things right between them. We're speaking for Christ himself now: Become friends with God; he's already a friend with you.

Paul Kretzmann's bible commentary interprets the passage like this. St. Paul wants to apply the demands of Christ's work to all circumstances of life. He felt believers should live like Christ, and allowed no fleshly considerations to influence his judgment and his treatment of others. It made no difference whether his neighbor or any man is of noble birth, of influential position, socially prominent, or rich, he dealt with all people. He had no selfish motives, or personal agenda.

And so, we strive to follow St. Paul's advice and focus on Christ as our center. Pray that you are able to accept and follow the insight of the Holy Spirit. Remember, He is already your friend! Peace,

We wanted to try out new ways to be in community, both with the people around us, and the people in LYF! Plus, we are opening up the Flex Meetings to anyone and everyone who would like to come-youth, parents, families, friends, and the congregation as a whole! These are great opportunities to try something new, build community in a variety of ways, and even give back to the community around us! I look forward to seeing some of you at these Flex Meetings! In addition to the flex meetings, we also have some new family ministry events built into the schedule this year, those are events geared towards fun for the whole family!
